

## Checklist: N5 Notice — Reason 2

Use this checklist if your landlord gave you an N5 Notice to End Your Tenancy **and they checked Reason 2: undue damage**.

If you answer **No** to any of the questions on this list, this might show a problem with the eviction notice. Make sure you raise it at any hearing or settlement meeting. If a question does not apply to you, leave it blank.

This is not a complete list of every reason you could use to fight the eviction notice.

It is best if you can get legal help before a hearing or settlement meeting.

		Does the notice show your correct street address and unit number?
		Is the notice signed by the landlord or the landlord's agent?
		Does the notice give <b>details</b> about the damage?
		Does the notice say <b>when</b> the damage happened?
		Does the notice say <b>who</b> caused the damage?
		If it was not a member of your household, does the notice say you allowed that person onto the property?
		If this is your first N5 in 6 months
		Is the termination date on the notice at least <b>20 days</b> after the notice is dated?
		Does the notice say how much it would cost for the landlord to get the damage fixed?
		Does the notice give you at least <b>7 days</b> to "void" the notice by fixing or paying for the damage?
		If the landlord has filed an L2 application with the Landlord and Tenant Board, did they file <b>after</b> the 7 days?

		Is the termination date on the notice at least <b>14 days</b> after the notice is dated?
		Does it say the damage happened within <b>6 months</b> after the landlord gave you the previous N5?
		Landlord's application to the LTB
		Was the L2 application filed within <b>30 days</b> after the termination date in the notice?
